Lesson #16: God's Discipline

INTRODUCTION

Why do you think most people think they can sin and "get away with it?"

OBSERVATION/INTERPRETATION

Read Hebrews 12:1-12

Note: "Race" comes from the Greek "agōn" from which we get agony. This implies the race is grueling and hard, requiring self-discipline, determination and perseverance. "Scourge" refers to flogging with a whip, a common and extremely painful Jewish practice.

- 1. Why would sin prevent us from running a good race? (ask Tiger or King David?)
- 2. Would you describe the Christian's life more as a sprint or a marathon? Why?
- 3. As Christians our race is not a race of work (to see how righteous we are or how many good deeds we can do) but a race *by* faith. Eph 6:16 Our competition is Satan, his world system, our own sinfulness (the flesh). Our strength is not ourselves, but the Holy Spirit. What does winning look like? Matt 25:21
- 4. If God uses hardship and affliction as a means of discipline, how can we tell the difference between His discipline and His punishment? How can we know if it's from God or Satan? (Job)
- 5. What are some of the responses that Christians have to God's discipline?
- 6. If Christ paid for our sins (Rom 8:1), why do we have to suffer the consequences?
- 7. How can God's discipline prevent us from sinning? 2 Cor 12:7-10
- 8. We are more likely to listen to God in times of affliction than blessings. How can God use discipline to teach us? Job 42:5
- 9. How does God's discipline prove His love and our sonship? Pr 3:12; Isa 69:9; Jn 1:12; Pr 13:24 10. If disciplined children respect their parents, why don't more parents discipline? Pr 29:15

APPLICATION

Are you embracing your sonship? What is preventing you from running a good race?
