- 3. According to verse 2, what does control of one's speech reveal about a person?
- 4. Why are James' words in verse two especially important to teachers?
- 5. What comparisons does James make to the tongue? (3-6) How do they illustrate the power of the tongue?
- 6. How can the tongue affect the course of one's life?
- 7. In what ways can the tongue be used for evil? For good? 1 John 3:7-10

Read James 3:7-12

- 8. How does James illustrate the power of the tongue? (7-8) **Ps 140:3**
- 9. If verse 8 is true, why do we even *try* to tame the tongue?
- 10. What is the source of the tongue's poor behavior? Mt 15:11, 18-20
- 11. What contrasts does James point out in verses 9-12? What is James' bottom line?
- 12. Reading between the lines, what do you think was going on in this church?
- 13. How can you gain control of your tongue? Phil 4:13
- 14. Jesus and the apostles Paul and Peter were not always "tame" when it came to the tongue. (John 7, Acts 17, Acts 4) When is "harsh" language *acceptable*?
- 15. How can your "talk" compliment your "walk"? Mt 7:16-20

- What positive words do family or coworkers need to hear from you this week?
