Moses: Learning To Lead God's Way

Lesson #5: Plagues That Preach

INTRODUCTION

What do you think most people's reaction would be to a miracle? Why?

OBSERVATION/INTERPRETATION

Note: Notice that each plague affected all the Egyptians and none of them softened the Pharaoh's heart. The first nine can be arranged in three groups: harassed people (1-3), caused pain (4-6) and terrified them (7-9). Each was directed at a specific Egyptian deity.

Read Exodus 7

- 1. Why do you think God initiated the plagues? vv. 7:3-5; Joshua 2:10-11
- 2. Why was the Nile an important place to start the lesson?

Read Exodus 8

- 3. The second plague (frogs) affected the Egyptians' perception of the goddess Heqet, the goddess of fertility and childbirth. How do you think the magicians could duplicate this miracle? Mt 24:24
- 4. What effect did plague three (gnats) have on the magicians? (19)
- 5. The Egyptians thought the gods had no power outside of their own territory. How did plague four (flies) affect the Israelites in the land of Goshen? (22,23)
- 6. How did the Israelites feel about Moses now? About God?
- 7. How did this plague affect Pharaoh? (25, 28)
- 8. Why didn't Moses give in to the Pharaoh's suggestions?
- 9. Why do you think the Pharaoh was so stubborn?
- 10. What counterfeits to God's power are in today's world? How do they affect our faith?
- 11. When God judges, he does a thorough job. What light do the plagues shine on the eternal fate of those who stubbornly refuse to turn to God? Ro 1:24-28, Jn 3:17,18
- 12. Is God singling out the Israelites because they are the "best" or because they are chosen? Why?
- 13. How does that make you feel about *your* relationship with God?

APPLICATION

Who do you know that needs to hear about God's judgment, power and love?

We may think of <u>judgment</u> as an ugly word, especially in our "overtolerant" society. But God's judgments reflect His flawless justice, His perfect standards of right and wrong. The plagues in Exodus 7-10 clearly and graphically display His condemnation of wrong and his deliverance of the oppressed who look to Him for help.
