LESSON #8 – YOU SHALL NOT COMMIT ADULTERY

INTRODUCTION

How does society view adultery today?

OBSERVATION/INTERPRETATION

Note: Israel was not much different than today because all around her was the worship of reproduction and sex. Deut 23:17, 18. Chastity and adultery were so important that, after a trial, a husband could have the woman stoned, a significant problem for Jesus' parents. Deut 22:13-21, Luke 1:34, Matt 1:19-20 Adultery is sexual intercourse by either husband or wife outside of marriage. Fornication (1 Cor 6:18) is intercourse between two unmarried people. Article 134 of the UCMJ defines adultery as intercourse that, at the time, the accused or the other person was married to someone else. The UCMJ is also concerned as to how it will affect good order and discipline and whether it discredits the armed forces. "The integrity of relationships is critical in the covenant community; the faithfulness of a man and woman to each other reflects the faithfulness of God to His people. In other ancient Near Eastern societies adultery was considered a "great sin" against the spouse. Scripture sees it as a sin against God, a denial of the covenant structure that binds a people to the Lord. It's no wonder that idolatry is frequently portrayed as spiritual adultery, a sin against the bond of intimacy that exists between the Lord and Israel." ¹
